

A message from our Minister Rev Robin Selmes...

November is traditionally the month when we look back and remember.

The beginning of the month is marked with services of Thanksgiving and Remembrance, as churches look back to loved ones who are no longer with us. From a personal perspective I am well aware that grief affects us for many years after the loss of a loved one and often lasts a lifetime and so these services enable those who have experienced the loss of someone they love, to give thanks and remember their loved ones before God. It marks also a time to reflect and remember those "great clouds of witnesses" who have gone before us in faith. Those who have surrounded us with encouragement, cheered us on, nurtured our faith and whom patiently, prayerfully laid the foundations to the church we have today.

Our next act of remembrance is on Remembrance Sunday. On this day we remember the millions of people who gave their lives in both World Wars so that we might enjoy peace today. In fact, it will be even more poignant, as this year will be the 100th anniversary of the end of conflict of the First World. To mark this, various events will take place across Medway to Remember and Reflect on those who gave their lives to this Country in this war. Stories will be told and memories will be shared and so I hope they will not be overshadowed by the political turmoil that we are facing. Equally we also need to remember that there have been other conflicts since then – the Falkland War and the two gulf Wars in which our troops have fought. We need to say thank you and support them in our prayers as still many today bear scars of these wars.



As this month is a particular time of remembrance we should not forget that such remembrance is at the heart of the Christian story, as Jesus eats supper with his friends for the final time, he takes bread and wine and instructs them to receive the same, bread and wine, to remember him, for this is his body and blood. 'Do this in remembrance of me' in the context of our lives speaks equally into the confusion and muddle, the uncertainties and fears of our own world and our own lives. Every time we celebrate Holy Communion we remember this command to be fed and empowered to go out and show the love of Christ in action- in our street, among our neighbours, with our colleagues, with our friends and families. This is about taking whatever is broken and then through Christ putting it back together again differently, to heal, to refresh and thereby to be changed. This takes time but begins when we remember.

Finally, as we start this month with a sense of sadness we end with a feeling of hope, as we enter the season of Advent. A time of anticipation, where we look forward rather than backwards, where we are reminded once again that the promise God made about salvation has come. This promise is the true hope beyond any other hope we have.

May God bless you in this season of remembrance and hope

We are a month into a new academic year and settling back in. We have started back up with all our groups; Youth group, Bible study, Sunday morning groups and the youth café (formally drop-in).

As I write this article, our young people are currently planning for the Harvest weekend, which is quickly approaching. It has been a real joy and blessing over the last 4 years to see the young people grow in confidence and gifting, as they have lead these services. We now have younger youth who are becoming involved in planning and leading the youth services and it is a joy to get to know their gifts and encourage them as they share their worship with the church. Our older lot (who are much more experienced in the youth services) are continuing to partake in the services and in some cases, leading and encouraging the younger ones. For the first time, we have a youth service in November that is just being led by just the God Squad, and I for one can't wait to see what they will be sharing with us.

Wednesday night youth group is now back will activities planned for the next term including bowling and Christmas cooking. Last night we had a quiz night, which included a surprise baby photo round. We had gathered baby photos of the young people (unknown to them). The leaders joined in as well, and it was fun guessing who all the super cute babies were.

Bible Study is also back – we continued to meet over the summer and had times of just relaxing and also looking at representations of Christ in films. We watched Narnia: The lion, the witch and the wardrobe and then discussed how C.S. Lewis based the story on Christ. Starting this month we shall be looking at the book of an American Pastor called John Gray, that many of us saw speak at Hillsong at the



beginning of the summer.

We re-launched Drop-in as a youth café this September. We have had a handful of young people come along. Please continue to pray for this, as we continue to reach out to the young people and advertise this. We are seeking God's guidance and plan with this group.

I am now working with the Chinese Church young people on a weekly basis and leading their youth Sunday school sessions. This month we have been exploring the Bible and prayer. Looking at why and how we pray, and we have explored what the Bible is and its importance and how it can help us in our lives.

What a glorious Harvest Weekend we had at the end of September - A sumptuous Harvest display and amazing Harvest Festival, led by our young people. Here are the words our talented youngsters wrote and delivered during the Sunday service:

Sharing Food | Food Waste

Harvest is an important event to celebrate because harvest marks the year of new produce of vegetables, fruits, nuts, wheat and allsorts.

Harvest is also a time to thank the farmers and factory workers for the food that we find in stores and, most importantly, our Lord our provider.

One of the negative things that comes out of harvest is the amount of food waste. This has been a huge problem and our world for many, many years. Every day, thousands of tonnes of food is wasted by throwing in the bin. Can anyone hazard an approximate guess how

much food is wasted in the UK in a year?
 Answer: In 2015, 7.7 billion tonnes of food was wasted, which comes to about £13 billion, in the bin!

Wasting food has always been a huge problem but there are ways we can help stop the increase of food waste.

Here are three ways that could help tackle the food waste issue:

- 1 You could make a shopping list and **stick** to it!
- 2 You could check what food you have first and what you need to buy
- 3 You could reduce waste by freezing things in the freezer - Remember it's not just for ice cream!

Sharing of Wisdom

Jon started with a quiz:

- 1 Who was prime minister in WW2
a) Winston Churchill
- 2 How many states in the USA are there?
a) 50
- 3 What year did England win the world cup?
a) 1966

What we are seeing here is that by answering this quiz together, we are sharing knowledge.

Let's think about this further by watching this short video clip of a Chinese proverb:

"Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day; teach a man to fish and you feed him for a lifetime."

In simple terms this proverb means that it is better in the long run to teach a person a craft, to share knowledge and wisdom, which allows them to provide for themselves for a lifetime. But let's not down play the need for sharing food because both sharing wisdom and food have equal importance

Let me explain by using an example from a charity, for example: A hurricane has destroyed a family's home and community. At this moment knowledge and wisdom is not the solution to address their immediate needs. Instead it is important that we begin by sharing food and equipment to help them build strength and rebuild their home.

Next we need to provide farming equipment. This is when sharing of wisdom cuts in. We need to Teach them how to use the equipment and new techniques in farming.

Soon they grow enough food for themselves and the village. Soon they grow enough food to sell and make money. We then need to show them how to get a fair price... and to run a business

And so through sharing of food we meet their immediate needs and then sharing of

knowledge we make a difference, a lifetime difference.

Jon then went on the ask the congregation for different ideas of how we can all share knowledge... and he displayed great skill receiving and developing the answers.

Sharing Love

Harvest can be the worse time of year for some people. It's when conditions worsen as we change to winter, it is when we are trapped inside and realise how lonely we truly are, or it is when we are stuck outside on the outskirts of society in the cold. This is why the celebration of harvest is truly important as it's the time where we replenish our souls along with our grain stores. It is the time where we must share love as much as we share the food we eat. And for the people who I know love food too much to share, it's the time we share like we share the air we breath or the water we drink. Because our love may be limited but with the power of God it's abundant, like His love for us.

Now look at what Beverly told us earlier, we waste so much food and people go hungry, when with redistribution and effort we could feed the planet. Love is much the same, we don't waste it, most of the time, but we don't distribute enough either. If it comes from an abundance source then surely there is enough for everyone. Similarly, it could be said for Jon's message of knowledge: in these times of political differences, international struggle and poverty, the sharing of knowledge and educating the planet for the better, becomes an after thought. It's ironic really, as sharing would solve all these problems.

Remember we reap what we sow, so let that be love. Remember we love because God first loved us. Let us share that message.

Remembering the end of World War One

This year Remembrance Sunday (11th November) marks the centenary of the end of World War One. Of the 65 million men who were mobilized, 8.5 million were killed and a further 21 million wounded. Wilfred Owen wrote of those 'who die as cattle.'

How should we celebrate this anniversary? In remembering the Armistice, our response should be to desire Micah's vision of universal peace in our world: *'They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.'* Micah 4:3.

However, why keep asking God for peace, when we continue to see such violence and unrest in our world? The Bible makes it clear that peace is not just the absence of war or being untroubled.

It means being in a right relationship with God through Jesus Christ, with other people and with wider society.

Of course, Micah's words are looking to end of time when God will make all things new in His universal kingdom. However, these promises also can speak to us now. The ministry of Jesus demonstrated the kingdom or reign of God breaking into the everyday, as He healed the sick and brought reconciliation and hope. When we pray for peace, we're rejecting the 'old order of things', of violence and war and asking God to make His kingdom real today. We're citizens of the new kingdom, reshaping the old.

The end of the centenary of World War 1 is a time to consider peace. Although the war did not bring a lasting peace to the world, for the Christian there's a deeper lesson: peace begins with the healing of hearts, the restoring of relationships and with a deep, costly commitment to justice.



Diary of a Momentous Year: November 1918 ~ When the Boys Came Home

By Autumn 1918 it was obvious that the war was coming to an end, Germany was clearly beaten, but no one had actually won. The front line was more or less as it had been for years, but after Amiens the Germans knew that this was a conflict they could never win. High level discussions took place, while in Britain the public mood was surprisingly optimistic. 'There's a silver lining', the songs said. 'Keep the home fires burning till the boys come home'. When an 'Armistice' was announced, there was euphoria. No more killing, the guns silenced. Peace at last!

'Armistice' was a new word for most people – not a peace treaty or settlement (that would follow a conference in Paris the following January), but simply a laying down of arms, but for many that was enough for now. 'No more killing', they declared. Most of the boys did come home, but tens of thousands didn't. We have tended to judge the first World War by the numbers involved – and they are appalling, but each casualty was also someone's personal loss, as I learnt in my first parish.

Pioneer Ministry without the ‘Collar’

Almost twenty years ago I walked through the “Joyful News” entrance to Cliff College. With a little nervousness and apprehension, I dragged my suitcase to my rather austere room, and sitting on the bed after waving my parents goodbye, realised this was the beginning of a new adventure with Jesus that would forever change my life.

During those three amazing years at Cliff College three significant decisions were made which have proved to be the best choices I have ever made. Firstly, that I was being called into ministry. Secondly, it was not ordained ministry. And, finally and most wonderfully, I should marry a beautiful and gifted fellow student, who thankfully said yes! It was not an easy decision to step back from the obvious route of travel towards ordination. Most people around me at the time expected me to get ordained, and there was a little frustration and disappointment when I didn’t follow through with this. The Holy Spirit navigated me through this period, time and again I would hear His voice calling me into ministry but something that didn’t seem to match the role of an ordained minister, it was something else, on the edge, on the streets, outside the normal structures, yet still belonging to them. My next steps beyond Cliff were far from obvious, and on the encouragement of one of my tutors Pete Philips, I put a PhD proposal into Sheffield

University, almost literally on the back of an envelope, to which they responded with an invitation and fee bursary! God had wonderfully opened a way forward and with an opportunity I had never expected. This has been the pattern of God’s leading ever since, opening doors and closing others, with each step requiring a good helping of trust and faith on my part. There have been tremendous ups and some rather crushing downs over the last twenty years, but God has faithfully led me to the place I now find myself, as we set out to plant a church for the second time. As I lead this new venture I am always impressed by how God brought me to be engaged as a church leader, on the edge



of the church’s structures, focused on mission and evangelism, yet with a freedom that comes from my rather unique role as a “lay” Pioneer Minister. What the Holy Spirit whispered to me all those years ago has become my reality as we launch a new congregation in the Ebbsfleet Garden City in north Kent.

Throughout this journey I have been captivated by a conviction that the Holy Spirit put into my heart on the night I recommitted my life to

Christ in 1996, that nothing less than revival was ever going to satisfy, and now that same conviction burns brighter than it ever has. Revival is a difficult word to use these days, particularly in polite church conversation about mission, not least because it took a beating during the heady days of the charismatic renewal and was further sullied by various scandals and manipulative emotionalism during the 1980s and 1990s. But, when I hear the word “revival”, and most importantly whenever I use it, there is something in my heart that literally shudders with expectation and excitement. For me it describes a move of the Spirit that is not defined by a “church brand” or a particular church leader’s personality, but one that so transforms the landscape of our nation that our society is richer, our collective hearts bigger, our economy fairer, and our love of Jesus evermore confident and sacrificial. My understanding of revival has been most nourished when I read of


next initiative but was the miraculous work of God into which we have been invited to participate, so like John Wesley or Samuel Chadwick, we too see communities, cities, and even nations changed. I know how this sounds and there is not the space here to explore all the ramifications of these “dreamy” sentiments, but here I stand knowing there is something afoot that demands my attention and foolhardy commitment. The Holy Spirit will move and it won’t fit the structures of our churches or follow the patterns of our best thinkers, it will look old yet be powerfully relevant, it won’t be politically correct but will bring real justice, and love will be outrageously revealed as a Holy transforming force and not a culturally compliant “fiction of compromise”. As I move to a new house and begin to form a new church here in Ebbsfleet I recognise more than ever that pioneering in the Spirit, and pursuing revival, has little to do with accepted strategies, and much more to do with the



John Wesley and George Whitfield’s exploits, and the faith and heart of those early Methodists, and most notably the pioneers who formed Cliff College, often against the odds, but to the glory of God. It is this kind of revival that I feel called to run after, one where the Holy Spirit changes the spiritual climate, that in partnership with Him the church brings in a harvest of people, one that we cannot take credit for, one that was not the result of our

scandalous level of love I am prepared to open myself up to in my friendship with Jesus. A place where my reputation with others has no value, where I am prepared to take seriously the miraculous nature of working with Him, where my powerlessness and surrender build His throne, and where my logic is suspended by a heart knowledge of an eternal kind. Pioneers in the Spirit are being stirred up all over the nation, **is He stirring your heart too?**

What if We Knew What God Knows About Us | Cris Rogers Monarch | £7.99

This is a book about who God is and who we are in light of that. What we think about ourselves will govern what we do. If we think we are powerless we will behave that way. If we believe we are weak we will be weak. If we believe we have no gifts we will not use our gifting. When we believe the wrong things about ourselves it stops us becoming the people we were created to be. The Bible tells us that in Jesus we are “a new creation” and yet sometimes we still wear the grave clothes of the old creation. But what if we knew what God knows about us? What if we knew the upside down, right way up, kingdom vision for our identity found in Jesus? What if we didn't just know it in our heads,


but our hearts were transformed by it and our hands lived it? When we know what God knows about us we will do the things He knows we can do. Our potential is limitless...


Journey with Me - 365 Daily Devotions | Catherine Campbell IVP | £9.74



Which best interest?

The Children Act takes its name from the 1989 law governing family courts, the first provision of which states 'the child's welfare shall be the court's paramount consideration'. Each day Judge Fiona Maye (Emma Thompson) must apply that basic legal principle to complex practical situations. Should she separate a child from a parent who might be emotionally damaging? Should she separate a conjoined twin from its other half who might be physically destructive? Each day she must try to act with dispassionate diligence as she makes decisions about other people's lives and relationships.



Now she is required to rule on the case of 17-year-old Adam Henry (Fionn Whitehead) who, together with his Jehovah's Witness parents, is declining a life-saving blood transfusion. What decision is in the best interest of this child, who would rather die than deny his faith? And what impact will this have on his life?



Judge Fiona takes the unusual step of visiting his bedside, and becomes emotionally involved. So, this powerful, multi-layered, film draws us in to consider the nature of life, love, faith and relationships. Fiona says that she presides over a 'court of law not of morals', but can these actually be separated? Is it possible for anyone in this world to know what is in someone's best interests? Indeed, can we ourselves even know what is in our own best interests?

As Fiona sits by Adam's bedside she sings for him a poem by W. B. Yeats, which evokes the sadness of a man looking back on a lost love, and ends with profound and thought-provoking lyrics relevant to all of us as we consider decisions that we must make in our own lives: 'She bid me take life easy, as the grass grows on the weirs; but I was young and foolish, and now am full of tears.'


God *in* the Arts

For 2018, the Rev Michael Burgess is exploring symbols of the Christian faith as found in works of art.

'The conscious water saw its God and blushed' – in those words, the poet Richard Crashaw describes the first miracle of Jesus at the wedding feast in Cana.

This sign at the beginning of our Lord's ministry points ahead to that other meal when a cup of wine will be poured out for many. The cup is a rich image of life in scripture: from the cup found in Benjamin's sack in Genesis to the cup of blessing in Paul's letters. The cup may be filled with bitter wine to reflect life's sorrow, while the cup of Psalm 23 overflows with goodness. It is as rich an image as the bunch of grapes we often see in a church window or carved on a screen – a sign of the goodness of Creation that brings us the gift of wine.

The wedding at Cana speaks to us of the generosity and gift of our Lord who transforms the feast. Duccio di Buoninsegna portrayed it in the panel he provided for the Maesta, the glorious altarpiece for Siena Cathedral in 1311. We see the table lavishly spread, while Jesus, sat by the side of His mother, blesses the water pots. The servants are busy pouring what is now wine into the



jugs and cups. It is the new wine of the kingdom.

Everywhere that Jesus went, the old was made new. For the widow of Nain he changed tears into joy, for Zacchaeus selfishness into love, for the thief on the cross despair into hope, for Mary Magdalene the end of the road into a new journey. What our Lord did at Cana, He went on doing in His ministry, changing not just water, but transforming human lives. And we share in that transforming love at every eucharist as we drink of the cup of blessing. These are some words of the poet Elizabeth Jennings:

'Those grapes, ready for picking, are the sign
Of harvest and of Sacrament.'

Psalm 139 – God knows you better than you know yourself

Yuri Gagarin, the first man in space in 1961, reportedly said 'I looked and looked but I didn't see God.' Psalm 139 sees things from a very different perspective, in which God can be found everywhere in the universe.

God is all Knowing: 'You have searched me, Lord, and you know me.' (v1). God knows my thoughts, habits, moods, words and choices, including the things done in secret. He knows me better than I know myself, and yet still loves me, despite my faults and failings! 'Such knowledge is too wonderful for me.' (6).

God is all present: 'Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?' (v7). In whatever circumstances we face, God is present with us, especially in the dark and

difficult times. If we know the path to God, we can find it in the dark!

God is all powerful: 'For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.' (v13,14). Both the vastness of the universe and the wonder of the growing embryo in the womb speak of the power of the creator God. We can trust Him because He knows our beginning and end and everything in-between: 'all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be.' (16).

How do we respond to what this psalm says? Are we prepared to constantly expose our inner life to God and consistently yield our whole life to Him? 'Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.' (v23/4).

For Britain, the First World War began on 4th August 1914 and ended on 11th November 1918. At the start, the British Government asked for 100,000 volunteers to join the Army. 750,000 applied in the very first month. An estimated 250,000 British boys lied about their age in order to join up. The youngest caught was just 12 - he was sent home. Average life expectancy in the trenches was just six weeks. In all, 65 million men from 30 countries fought in the First World War. More than nine million fighting men were killed during the conflict, a third of them through disease. At least 750,000 of these were British. The Victoria Cross, the highest military award, was awarded 628 times in the First World War.


